Last week I went through my cupboards and as packets and tins get pushed to the back inevitably you find yourself with out of date products.


Splish, splosh, February-fill-the-dyke

Another event in February is St. Valentine's Day on the 14th. In 1995 Norfolk Federation published a book entitled Norfolk within Living Memory. Previously members had been asked to contribute to this book by writing about how their village had changed over the years and also about customs that had died out. A member from Ingoldisthorpe wrote how the children celebrated the 14th of February.

'A group of children would meet at a prearranged place and went off to sing at every door of the houses and remained until the occupant opened up and gave them money. They covered much of the village before going to school. The head teacher Miss Yaxley let them out of school early so that they could finish their rounds. When they went to the Rectory, Rev. Wynne made them stand

in a half circle while he did a head count and then gave them a penny each. At the Hall Col. Davey counted them and again gave a penny to each of them. At the Manor the gardener threw apples and sixpences at them.

They then ran down to the village shop where the money was counted and divided between them all. What was left over was used to buy sweets and they usually ended up with two or three sweets each. After a quick meal at their homes, they rushed back to school for the afternoon'.

History of a Village Sign



In a previous Newsletter Sylvia asked if any Members living outside the village could tell us about their village sign. To get the ball rolling I thought I would tell you about the village where I used to live before I moved to Ingoldisthorpe. The village sign in Landbeach near Cambridge was erected in 1978 to commemorate the Jubilee of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II. It was carved and painted by two local men. Stand facing the church and you will see the scene in front of you reflected in the carving on the sign, the church and the thatched cottage bisected by the tree. On the reverse side are pictured some of the historical connections of the

village. The bishop's mitre represents Matthew Parker, the most famous of Landbeach rectors, who became the first Archbishop of Canterbury in 1558 during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. The coat of arms between the church and the barn is that of Corpus Christi College who, as Lords of the Manor of Chamberlains, owned the living. The tithe barn indicates the link between the farming community and the church. The three sheep represent the flocks that were brought to graze on the higher pastures in Landbeach when Waterbeach was flooded in the winter. The sign was unveiled on 23rd April 1978 by the two oldest and the two youngest inhabitants of the village, one of which was my son John aged 3 months. *Di*
