From our very own NHS Voluteer Responder

In March, the Prime Minister asked for NHS volunteer responders to assist local people who were self isolating during the lockdown. The clients would be referred by various professionals and linked to volunteers who would be able to assist in various ways. As I have pre-existing health conditions, I was only able to volunteer as a "check in and chat volunteer". The Royal Voluntary Service sent me a link so I could use my mobile phone and they did some checks on me. They also sent links to their codes of conduct and helpful guidelines. I report on duty when available and a siren sounds on my phone if I'm needed. I can then accept or reject the task. If I reject the task it is passed on to another person. If I accept I am sent the phone number and the name of the client. I have volunteered for nearly 1000 hours so far but have only had two requests, one of which I missed. The other lady I phoned and had a chat with her but she did not need any further assistance. If she had, I would have contacted the support centre. It seems that Attleborough has plenty of support systems in place which is a good reflection on the community spirit present in the town. I am pleased that I volunteered and look forward to providing further assistance if necessary.

Betty Stacey's Chocolate Cake:

5 oz self-raising flour 6 oz caster sugar 6 oz margarine

3 oz Cadbury's Drinking Chocolate 3 large eggs 3 tablespoons of boiling water

Preheat oven to 170° Gas Mark 4. Mix all the ingredients and beat well until smooth.

Pour into prepared sandwich tins (size 7-8") and cook for about 35-40 minutes.

When cold sandwich together with butter cream. The whole cake can also be covered with good quality cooking chocolate... and then scoffed before anyone else gets the chance (my words – editor!)
