Trips and Outings

Instead of our usual meeting in August, a group of members met at The Aviator in Sculthorpe and enjoyed an evening meal. The menu was varied and tasty and the chat and laughter was abundant as usual.

Unbelievable after a summer of blistering heat and cloudless days we managed to choose a day of changeable weather for our visit to Wild Ken Hill at the end of August. The visit started off in one of the farm buildings where our guide gave us a brief overview of the way the estate is run. Then 12 intrepid members boarded a trailer to commence a tour around the estate which is divided into 3 sectors, regenerative agriculture, rewilding and conservation. Unfortunately at our second stop the heavens opened with horizontal wind and rain, leaving the people on one side of the vehicle completely soaked. Undaunted like true WI members we carried on and were rewarded by sightings of horses, cattle, deer, buzzards, red kites and finally the highlight, a visit from a Tamworth pig and her piglets who live in the woods. Everyone had a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon and we would certainly consider running this trip again next year for the members who were disappointed at not being able to book a place this year.



For our next trip we will be joining Dersingham WI on their visit to Blickling Hall on Friday 7th October, 5 members have booked but there is still space on the coach if anyone else is interested. A board will be out at the meeting.

Our next proposed outing will be to Baytree Owl and Wildlife Centre Spalding on Wednesday 19th October. The centre has a large collection of British Wildlife and over 100 birds, for our admission price of £6 we will also be able to view their flying demonstration of owls and raptors. The centre has a coffee shop and restaurant and also a number of shops such as The Works and the Edinburgh Woollen Mill if you fancy spending some money. The centre is accessible for anyone who has problems walking and there is plenty of seating available. A board will be out at the September meeting to gauge interest.
