Mary Stewart, born in 1876, was the author of the 'Collect for Club Women', a prayer that became the official creed of the Women's Institute. She was the principal of a high school in Longmont, Colorado when she wrote the Collect. The creed, also known as the Alberta Creed, was a personal meditation that gained popularity and was adopted by the WI as its creed.

The Alberta Creed

'Keep us O Lord from pettiness; let us be large in thought, in word and deed. Let us be done with fault-finding and leave off self-seeking. May we put away all pretence and meet each other face-to-face, without self-pity and without prejudice. May we never be hasty in judgment and always generous. Teach us to put into action our better impulses straight forward and unafraid. Let us take time for all things: make us grow calm, serene, gentle. Grant that we may realise that it is the little things that create differences; that in the big things of life, we are one. And may we strive to touch and know the great human heart familiar to us all, and O Lord God, let us not forget to be kind.'
