Recipe of the Month



Golden Syrup Soufflé

If you like quick easy and inexpensive desserts this is a must, it was given to me by a friend many years ago and never fails to please.

Heat the oven to 160°C and grease a soufflé dish.

- ❖ You will need Golden Syrup, enough to cover the base of the dish, the depth depends on your sweet tooth. The more the merrier, say I.
- ❖ 8 good slices of White thick cut bread preferably from an unsliced loaf.
- ❖ Spreadable butter, reduced fat will do if you are watching your figure, (you have to make some concessions).
- ❖ 2 large eggs and enough milk to make up to 1 pint with the beaten egg. Full cream milk is best but semi skimmed is still nice.

Remove the crusts from the bread, butter it and place in the dish in layers.

Beat the egg and milk together and pour over the bread and golden syrup.

Leave to stand and make sure all the bread is moist. Place in the middle of the oven and cook until well risen and set.

Serve with Whipping cream or crème fraiche and wedges of lemon. The lemon and the cream helps cut through the sweetness of the golden syrup. ENJOY

Gardening Notes

All pruning done for the present, it's time to admire the colourful bulb display in the gardens, daffodils, narcissus, tulips, hellebores, grape hyacinths and wild garlic. However once these have finished, pinch off the dead flower heads but leave the leaves to replenish the bulbs. Every year I endeavour to remove the wild garlic and grape hyacinths as they are both very intrusive.

Three shrubs that look spectacular at present are the forsythia, camellias and magnolias. I have a fine specimen of which is almost equal to that which Sylvia Spears gave home to.

I have now cut back my midwinter fire cornus much to Carole's chagrin but if I didn't, next winter it would not have such fiery red and orange stems. I did manage to take cuttings for both Barbara and Carole to add winter colour to their gardens as well.

Most of the work I have been doing has been planting vegetable seeds. In doors I have three types of tomatoes, cucumber, chillies, peppers, carrots, beetroot not to mention dahlias and antirrhinums all started off in a heated propagator in the greenhouse before planting out.

Because it's been so cold recently my fuchsias and other potted plants are unusually still residing there, together with some which friends have snuck into over winter! I'm not quite sure what to charge for board and lodging. So warm they have been that Carole's pelargonium is in flower.

I did manage to squeeze a dozen runner beans and a dozen broad beans both of which are shooting on the greenhouse shelving but I will have to evict the visitors soon to be able to put in the tomatoes in grow bags and cucumbers in large pots inside.

Although I have made a good start for a couple of months I will have to rely on others to do the heavy work as hopefully my knee op will go ahead this time.

SCAM ALERT!

- **1. Lockdown Texts From Government**: The Government has been texting the public when restriction guidelines have changed. However, scammers are making the most of that and are sending out similar looking messages. Ofcom says that official texts come from 'UK-gov' and begin GOVUK CORONAVIRUS ALERT. Messages which do not fit the template should be ignored, deleted and reported.
- **2.** Track and Trace. Some people have received a text which tells them to isolate and then takes them to a website where they are asked for personal information. Legitimate texts will come from NHStracing and calls will come from 0300 0135 000.
- **3. Royal Mail Scams.** Royal Mail have warned customers of a fake delivery text. The text reads:"your Royal Mail parcel is awaiting delivery. Please confirm the settlement of 1.99 (GBP) on the following link." If a fee is due on an item we'd leave a grey card to confirm this, we wouldn't send a text.
- **4. Vaccine Scams.** Trading Standards have confirmed that victims are being contacted out of the blue to say they are due for a vaccination jab. They are then asked to click on a link and provide personal or financial details all on a convincing mock-NHS website. Legitimate contact for COVID 19 vaccinations will come from the NHS, who will not ask for you for personal or financial details.



How to access the WI Website

These instructions are based on the assumption that you have at least basic computer skills.

- ★ Open an internet web browser as you would normally do using, for example, Microsoft Internet Explorer, Firefox or Google Chrome.
- ★ In the URL BAR (that's the bar at the very top of the screen where you type the address of the website you want to access), type in National Federation of Women's Institutes (or just NFWI will work too) and then press enter.
- ★ The first entry that comes up should be National Federation of Women's Institutes. Click on this and you will be taken to the web page.

- ★ Look for 'Find a WI' in the top right hand corner of the page. Click on this and you will see a box on the left hand side of the screen where you can 'search for local groups in your area'. Enter your postcode and click 'Search'
- ★ Ingoldisthorpe Village will be listed. Just click on the 'Find out more' box.
- ★ On the left hand side of the screen you will see a list of the various pages you can visit. Here you will find up to date information about our WI, including who your committee members are, meeting dates, future events and event reports.

Canary Pudding

Feedback - Thanks to Margaret Collison who has been going through old recipe books inherited from her mother and has found a recipe for Canary Pudding.

6 oz Butter or Margarine Grated rind of half a lemon 6 oz Castor Sugar 6 oz. flour

3 Eggs 1 level teaspoon of baking powder

Grease 1½ pint size pudding basin or mould.

Cream together the fat and sugar until softer and lighter in colour.

Gradually beat in the eggs and add lemon rind, stir in lightly the flour and baking powder.

Pour into the basin or mould and cover with greased paper.

Steam for one and a half hours. Turn out and serve with jam sauce.

Jam Sauce

4 good tablespoons of jam

Half a pint of water

1 heaped teaspoon of arrowroot Colouring if needed

Sugar and lemon rind

Boil the jam and water together, add the sugar and lemon juice to taste and thicken with arrowroot blended with a little cold water.

Strain the sauce if the jam has pips. Colour if necessary. Serve.

Example of a letter to the Right Hon. Mr. Matthew Hancock

Dear Mr. Hancock

My local hospital is The Queen Elizabeth at Gayton Road, King's Lynn and it is in a dire state of repair. When it was opened in 1980, it had an expected working life of 30 years.

Now in parts, it is falling to pieces. "Steel props have been installed to support the roof in 41 different areas where concrete planks are failing. Wards have had to be closed and patients moved elsewhere – including to other hospitals".

A risk assessment warns that "there is a direct risk to life and safety of patients, visitors and staff due to the potential of catastrophic failure of the roof structure deficiencies".

This hospital serves the area of West Norfolk, and parts of Lincolnshire & Cambridge, the population of these areas has dramatically increased since 1980 and a new hospital is desperately needed.

Please consider this a matter of urgency.
