Parry's family supported the Women's Suffrage Movement and they took the hymn as their anthem in 1928 when all women were allowed to vote. After Parrys death the copyright was given to the Women's Institutes. Blake wrote the words during the time of the Industrial Revolution

which he felt had destroyed both nature and family life as many country people moved to the cities where there was work and better pay.

A Favourite Walk

My favourite walk is one that I used to enjoy with my dog Holly. You can either catch the bus to Old Hunstanton, alight at the bus stop at the junction with Sea Lane and the mainroad, walk down Sea Lane until you reach the junction with Wodehouse Road and turn right. If you go by car take the main road to Old Hunstanton, turn off at the junction with the main road and Golf Course Road, drive on past the Le Strange Hotel until you meet Wodehouse Road. You can usually park along here or on the adjoining roads. Walk along Wodehouse Road until you reach Sandy Lane on the left by the new houses, take this turning and carry on down a small path until you meet the path behind the sand dunes. Turn right along this path which runs between the Golf Course on your right and the beach huts and the dunes on your left. Walk along this path for about a mile when you arrive at Holme beach. You now have a choice, you can either retrace your footsteps or go over the dunes onto the beach. Holly's and my preference was always the beach, walk along the beach until you reach the path that takes you up past the lifeboat station opposite the Boathouse cafe where you can stop for a rest and a coffee and cake before carrying on until you reach your starting point. Approx 2 ½ miles in total.

As I've always wondered about the village pub at Cockley Clay which is called The Twenty Churchwardens I was immediately interested. Cockley Clay was part of the Hilborough group of 10 Parishes, and with 2 Churchwardens per parish and with the pub being next door

to the church what better name for it. No doubt the churchwardens all meet up every now and again for some light refreshment.

Smokers may be familiar with the word Churchwarden as it is a long stem pipe for smoking tobacco. In the days when churches were never locked, the wardens or other local men watched over the building during the night. They smoked these long stem pipes so the smoke and pipe would not be in their line of sight.

Famous people who live in Norfolk



Stephen Fry - Actor, comedian and presenter, he spent his childhood in Booton, near Reepham. He now splits his time between London and Norfolk and has a home in West Bilney. Stephen says 'the Norfolk skies get into your soul in whichever part of the county you happen to be'.



Janet Street Porter - Recognised for her work as a Journalist and her appearances on television as a member of the Loose Women team, Janet moved from Yorkshire to Thurlton in south Norfolk in search of 'the good life in the countryside'.



Desmond MacCarthy - The eccentric and outspoken owner of Wiveton Hall has become a cult figure since he was thrust into the limelight in the documentary 'Normal for Norfolk' – not that he wasn't already a bit of star among the locals and visitors to his farm and café.



Lisa Goddard - Lives near Fakenham and appeared in Bergerac and Give Us a Clue. Lisa was previously married to Colin Baker and Alvin Stardust. Sadly she lost her third husband, David Cobham in 2018. He was the founding member of the Norfolk based Hawk and Owl Trust.



Brendan Coyle - Best known for playing John Bates, the valet to the Earl of Grantham, in Downton Abbey. Brendan lives just down the road in Heacham. He divides his time between London and Norfolk and is Patron at The King's Lynn Arts Centre.



Martin Shaw - An English stage, television and film actor born in Birmingham but later moved to Norfolk. He is most famous for his roles in The Professionals, Judge John Deed, The Chief and Inspector George Gently. He moved to the village of Hingham in Norfolk during his time working on the TV show 'The Chief' from 1993 to 1995.
