"Coronation Gardens for food & nature" is organised by The Wildlife Trusts in partnership with the National Federation of WIs

The aim of the competition is to encourage you to grow your own food in wildlife-friendly gardens or other spaces and produce an A4 album that records your experiences over the first year in no more than 12 pages plus a cover.

In taking part in the competition your WI will aim to achieve at least 4 out of the 5 criteria listed below, in one or more gardens, local spaces either at home or in a community space. These should be new initiatives. A window box is not too small!

Any number of venues within your WI may be included and any number of your members may be involved.

The album will consist of:

- An introduction
 - Who is taking part and why you have decided to take part
- The beginning
 - At least one photograph with a brief description of what your garden(s)/spaces looked like at the start
- The middle
 - Halfway progress with photographs and a description to show progress.
- The end
 - Your final photographs and description to show what difference you have made to your space
- Conclusion
 - What worked, what didn't and what you feel you have achieved and the impact on wildlife

The five features of the national initiative to create a garden that is great for you and for wildlife are:

- 1. Grow healthy food to eat. This could range from herbs and salads, through to fruit and vegetables.
- 2. Plant pollinator-friendly blooms. Butterflies, moths, bees and hoverflies all need sources of pollen to thrive.
- 3. Create a water feature. It could be as simple as a submerged dish or as involved as digging a pond, lining it and oxygenating it with local plants such as hornwort.
- 4. Leave a patch of long grass or piles of logs. This is the perfect way to create shelter for wildlife such as hedgehogs, frogs and insects.
- 5. Go chemical and peat free. Avoid using pesticides, weedkillers and peat.
