# Information for New Members



## How Did It All Begin?

Originating in Canada in 1897, the WI was founded by Adelaide Hoodless, a farmer's daughter who lost her fourth child through ignorance of basic hygiene. The first meeting was attended by 101 women at Stoney Creek, Ontario, and urged that lectures and demonstrations in domestic science and home-crafts be made available to rural women.

The first WI in the UK met in September 1915 at Llanfair PG, Anglesey, North Wales.

The first 22 WIs in Norfolk were formed in 1918 and the following are still in existence: Barnham Broom & District, Ditchingham, Hardingham, Hethersett, and Hingham. The Norfolk Federation was formed on the morning of Saturday, 1<sup>st</sup> February 1919. Lady Evelyn Suffield was the first Chairman.

## What It's All About?

We have now grown into the largest voluntary women's organisation in the UK. We are non-sectarian and non-party political.

The aim of the WI is to provide a democratically controlled educational and social organisation for women, offering quality of life in the community, and enabling them to develop their own skills and talents

## How Does It Work?

Every WI is affiliated to a Federation and there are 69 County and Island Federations. Those Federations are, in turn, affiliated to the National Federation based in London.

There are over 220,000 members who belong to some 6,300 WIs located in

England, Wales, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

### National Federation of WIs

The National Federation (known as "National") is run by a Board of Trustees, elected every two years by secret ballot, by all WIs and Federations.

There are several committees covering all the topics which WIs are interested in. Members from all over the Country are appointed to serve on those committees.

Like Federations, there are also paid administrative staff who help to run the numerous facets of the organisation.

### County Federations

Federation Boards of Trustees are also elected by secret ballot every two years by all the WIs in that Federation.

Just like National, there are various committees, with members appointed from the county.

The Norfolk Federation currently has over 3,700 members in 121 WIs.

### WIs

The Committee is elected annually by the members, again by secret ballot.

We all work together on the issues that affect us at every level; whether it be education, leisure, the local community, women's welfare, the environment or international affairs, a WI somewhere is interested and active.

Everyone who serves on a Committee, at whatever level, is a volunteer.

## How Does Your WI Work?

Each member pays an annual subscription when she joins the WI. This is reviewed every year and fixed by the National Board of Trustees.

The subscription is divided between your WI, the Federation and National.

As part of your subscription, you will receive eight copies of *WI Life* a year. This magazine is produced by the National Federation. It is posted to you at home and is full of useful information.

The three levels of the organisation are governed by a Constitution. Your WI may also have some bylaws, pertinent only to them.

All WIs must hold 11 meetings in the year and once you have paid your subscription, you are entitled to attend these meetings without any extra cost. August meetings are traditionally a time when WIs have a summer party or an outing instead of a meeting. Many WIs will also have a “bring and buy” stall or a raffle, but these are optional.

At the monthly meeting, there will be some official business, a speaker or demonstrator and a chance to chat to fellow members over refreshments.

As well as their monthly meeting, a lot of WIs have craft groups, book clubs, walking groups, darts and bowling teams, and others beside, who will meet during the month.

Your WI is run by a Committee, nominations for which are sought the month before the Annual Meeting (normally November). The Officers are the President, the Secretary and the Treasurer. The number of other committee members is set by the WI's bylaws.

### **Dual Membership**

You can belong to more than one WI. You will have a main WI, to whom you pay the full subscription and will pay about half the subscription to your second (or third!) WI. You will have voting rights on WI matters at all WIs you belong to but can only vote on National or Federation matters at your main WI.

# Some WI Jargon Explained

As with any organisation, there are lots of terms and abbreviations, which a new member can find confusing! So here are some of the most commonly used ones:

## ACWW



Associated Country Women of the World. The WI is a member of ACWW, working together with other

women's organisations across the world to raise the living standards of rural women, to promote international friendship and understanding and a voice for countrywomen on international matters. WIs can donate to ACWW by collecting loose change. This scheme is called 'Pennies for Friendship'. The Board of Trustees choose a specific ACWW project and money raised by WIs goes toward that.

## AFM

Autumn Federation Meeting (or known simply as "Autumn Meetings"). Four or Five meetings held in various venues around the County, at different times and days, to enable as many members as possible to attend. There are usually two speakers – one on a social concern topic, the other more light-hearted. All the Committees are present with a stand with information on their activities, together with other items of interest.

## Annual Meeting – also known (incorrectly!) as the National AGM:

The National Annual Meeting, held in June, in different venues around the Country. It is usually known by the city

in which it's held (for 2022, "Liverpool")! Every WI is linked in a group of WIs, who take it in turns to send a delegate. Delegate expenses are paid for by the WIs they represent. Members can attend as Observers (or Visitors), but have to pay. It is at this meeting that all WIs cast their votes for the Resolutions. There is always a big-name guest speaker or two. The Federation arranges coach travel and, because of the distance, organises a one or two-night stay.

## Annual Meeting

Held by every WI to elect the officers and committee.

## BoT

The Federation Board of Trustees. They are responsible for the overall running of the Federation.

## FAM

The Federation's Annual Meeting, held in the first few months of the year, in Norwich. Each WI is represented by one voting delegate and other members of each WI are welcomed as paying guests. This is an all-day event, at which there is some business in the morning and an interesting guest speaker in the afternoon. There is also time to view each Committee's stand, giving details of events and what they do.



## FO

Federation Office. Also known as The House or The Office. This is where all the administration for the Federation is carried out, including generating all the flyers and other information sent out in the monthly mailing.

## Group

Neighbouring WIs form a Group to meet together once or twice a year. The advantage of being in a Group is that they can often afford more expensive speakers. It is also a good way to get to know members from other WIs.

## The Harnser

The Norfolk name for a Heron and the symbol of the Federation.



## MCS

Membership Communication System. When you join the WI your details are entered onto this national database. This information is used to send out *WI Life*, for National to plan interesting events and is a tool for your WI to keep in touch with members. Every WI should have an MCS Rep, who keeps the information up-to-date and is the only one with access to that information. Details are never passed to third parties.

## My WI

Is the National dedicated WI website, exclusive to members. You can access all sorts of information from here. Make sure you give your MCS Rep your email address and you will automatically be sent login details.

## NFWI

Refers to the **National** Federation of Women's Institutes.

In Norfolk, though, it also refers to OUR Federation – the **Norfolk Federation** of WIs, run by a Board of Trustees, elected every two years by Norfolk WIs.

If you receive any correspondence and can't decide who sent it – check the address!

## Resolutions

Every year members put forward suggestions for Resolutions. Resolutions are proposals for campaigns. A shortlist of possible Resolutions is sent to every WI and every member votes for a Resolution they care about. From this, the most popular Resolutions nationally go forward for full debate at every WI meeting in May. The voting results of those debates are given at the Annual Meeting and if a majority "Yes" vote, the Resolutions will become national campaigns.

# The Norfolk Federation – A Brief History

The Federation formed on Saturday, 1<sup>st</sup> February 1919.



**Our First President and then Chairman, from 1919-1945**

**Lady Evelyn Suffield**

*“There is nothing I care more for than the Women’s Institute. The more Institutes I visit the more I realise what a happy family we are.”*

Lady Suffield was an inspirational, and much-loved County President for nearly thirty years. She travelled round the county lecturing on the WI and Public Health in the Villages. Encouraging members to work with her and with each other, and keen to bridge the class divide, as she described at the time, ‘between the labourer’s wife and the great lady’. Asking members to encourage younger women to join the WI she hoped they would be a little more tolerant if they missed a meeting or two and not be so prim and proper! Otherwise, she warned them, ‘it’ll only be us old ones left!’ Lady Suffield retired as the first and last President in March 1948, a resolution was passed that no further president be elected. She died at home, Harbord House, Cromer in 1951, in her 81<sup>st</sup> year

## **Federation Offices: Where it all began**

In 1920 a suite of rooms was secured to use as offices for the newly formed Norfolk Federation of Women’s Institutes at 3 Davey Place, Norwich. Early in 1939 the Executive Committee was faced with the urgent problem of finding new premises. A lease was secured on 3 Castle Street, Norwich. In 1950 a Resolution was passed that the Executive purchase a building or building site for a permanent WI Headquarters.

This decision laid a great responsibility on all the members to raise funds. Institutes, on their own initiative, contributed £276 11s 4d (£276.57). Due entirely to the efforts of members of the Federation, the sum of £4,000 was eventually raised to purchase a Georgian House in the centre of Norwich.

The move to 45 All Saints Green, Norwich, took place on 31<sup>st</sup> July 1952. The official opening ceremony was performed on 5<sup>th</sup> September, and the house named ‘Evelyn Suffield House’ in memory of the Federation’s founding Chairman. Miss Gates, the Federation Secretary from 1946-1967, lived on the first floor!

The typewriters of the 1950s may be silent now and letters written with pen and ink are a thing of the past, this special house remains a place for members to relax and enjoy one another’s company, with opportunities to learn new skills. Evelyn Suffield House continues to be the busy, working heart of the Federation, and a wonderful legacy initiated by those women of the WI, over 60 years ago.

# Federation Committees

There are 8 Federation Committees, who organise numerous events for members.

- Arts & Leisure Activities
- Digital Training
- Sales & Marketing
- Communications
- Membership Advisory
- Federation Events Team
- Creative Activities
- Public Affairs

Everyone on a Committee is a WI member herself and all are volunteers. The Chairman of each Committee is also a member of the Board of Trustees. The Committees explain what they do below.

## Arts & Leisure Activities

Our remit includes “the arts”, (such as music, drama, art appreciation, museum and theatre trips), as well as encouraging members to take part in sporting and leisure activities. We organise demonstrations, lectures, instruction and competitions in leisure, arts and sporting activities.

Among the regular events which take place are 10-pin bowling and darts tournaments. The Bridge Club meets on Wednesday mornings in The House and holds bridge lunches twice a year. The Mah Jong Club also meets fortnightly in The House. If you are interested in coming along to these Clubs, contact the Office for details.

As well as arranging outings to places of interest, the Committee also organises Federation holidays.

There are taster days for activities that members have expressed an interest in. Members throughout the

Federation are encouraged to submit new ideas and requests through the Federation Office, to add new pursuits as well as old favourites to the calendar.

## Communications



Our role is to connect with members old and new, to reach out to future members and to help the Federation and its Committees promote the WI and what we do in Norfolk. We do this through The Norfolk WI News magazine, our website and social media. We also tell the public at large how fabulous an organisation we are, get people involved in our campaigns, our crafts and our leisure activities. We also organise the annual Federation Writing Competition. One of our responsibilities is assisting our team of EDP writers, who contribute weekly articles and occasional “Op-Ed” pieces to the Eastern Daily Press. The Communications Committee works closely with the Digital Activities Committee.



## Creative Activities

The Committee is responsible for providing activities involving visual and creative arts to all members within the Federation. The aim of the Committee is to promote all aspects of the arts for your enjoyment, in the form of demonstrations, exhibitions, competitions, and organising trips to exhibitions and Museums. There are opportunities to attend all-day workshops at the Federation Office, or around the County. These have been as diverse as ribbon embroidery, stained glass and cookery demonstrations. There are annual Craft Days, with a variety of courses to choose from, with skilled tutors on hand to assist.

“The Centenary Salver”, a co-operative competition, is held annually and all WIs within the Federation can take part. The theme of the competition is decided by the Committee and various crafts are undertaken to interpret that theme.

We can also arrange for our Pop-up Shop, of donated craft items (such as embroidery silks and knitting wool), to be available for WI meetings.

Some courses are available to certificate level should you wish to take your interest further; for instance, we also organise Food Hygiene Certificates. The Committee aims to reflect the requirements of members and therefore suggestions for future activities are always welcomed.

## Digital Training Team

We are here to inspire, enthuse, educate and guide members to develop their digital skills. As part of that remit we organise digital training courses, which take place at Federation Office, and work closely with the Communications Committee. We can also organise workshop sessions for small groups of WI members in the village or town where you live – just get in touch with the Federation Office if you would be interested in a session. If you need some individual assistance, contact us on our dedicated email helpline. We may not know all the answers, but we will do our best!

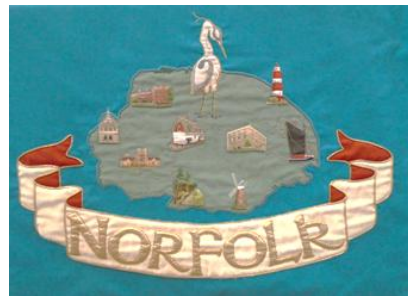


## Membership Advisory

This Committee is composed of WI Advisers and Assistants whose function is to assist, encourage and advise WIs, and potential trainee Advisers. These members are trained by the National Federation and appointed by the Federation. We aim to make sure that WI members know everything that is available to them and to help them get the most from their subscription. Our role is to create a link between the members and the County and National Federations. WI Advisers are always looking for opportunities to open new WIs and trying to help with any problems that the existing ones may have.

We run training days on all aspects of committee work, on the expectations of Officers, committee members and new

members. These are informal sessions where you can learn with friends in small groups. WI Advisers visit WIs and attend their Annual Meetings, can help with elections, and are always available to give help throughout the year. Your Adviser is only a phone call away, so do make contact as no query or problem is too small and a brief chat or prompt action can often help.



Federation Banner created by a member. It is displayed in the Members' Room and only exhibited at FAM

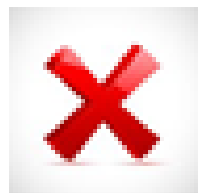
## Public Affairs

The aim of this Committee is to keep members up-to-date on matters of public concern. We advise, initiate and undertake to follow up work on National and County mandates of social concern, including the National Green Hearts campaign and International Women's Day. The Committee includes the following Norfolk Federation appointments: ACWW Representative, Carers & Health Matters, Environment Officer, Climate Ambassador, Resolutions Co-ordinator and Science Representative. So that our voice is heard, the Federation has appointed Committee members to represent the WI in other organisations: these include Age UK Norfolk, Norfolk Carers and the Norfolk Bus Forum.

We arrange events on diverse topics such as science and the environment, health and home, and women's affairs locally and globally. The annual Women Walk the World, part of ACWW, is a popular event organised by the Committee.



One of our most important jobs is to guide WIs through the Resolutions, organising information days for members, with experts to give us more background information before we cast our votes. Please write in if we can help you in any way.



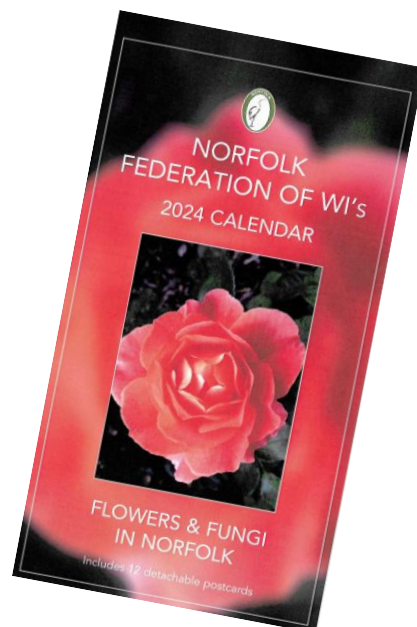
## Sales & Marketing

The Sales & Marketing Committee are responsible for sourcing the range of gift items for sale in the Federation Office and at Federation Events. We also ensure that all the stationery requirements of a WI are stocked, including the National WI diary.

The Federation Calendar is also organised by the Committee. This is an annual competition, where members are invited to submit photographs on a chosen theme.

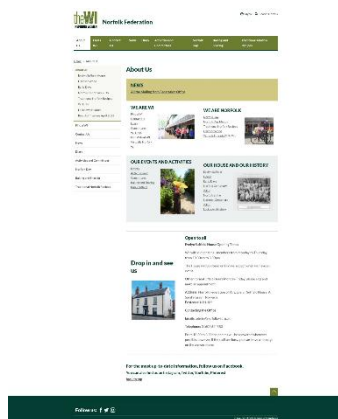
It is on Elsing Road, Elsing, Dereham, NR20 3DX.

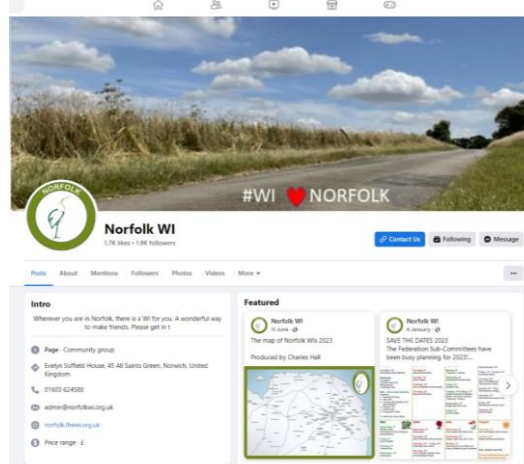

## **Bursaries**

The Federation is very lucky to be able to offer a number of bursaries. Your WI may well do so, too.

Bursaries are open to all members, to be used for a variety of educational opportunities. Some are for use in Norfolk only and some to help with the cost of attending other courses. For a chance to win one, all you have to do is send in your name, contact details and WI. Information about the bursaries is published in Norfolk WI News.

## **Office Staff (“the office”)**

There are three paid members of staff:

**Louise Casson – the Federation Secretary.** With the Board of Trustees her role is to run the Federation, manage the House and Office, and help members and WIs with queries. Louise works full-time Monday to Friday, 8.30am–4.30pm

**Vanessa Scott – the Finance Officer.** Vanessa manages the Federation’s finances, with the Federation Treasurer. If you have a WI financial query, contact Vanessa. She works Mondays and Tuesdays, 9.00am–4.00pm and Wednesdays, 9.00am–2.00pm

**Helen Hall – the Administrative Officer.** She carries out all the administration for Federation events and helps Louise. If you have any questions about an event contact Helen, who works Monday –Thursday, 8.30am–4.00pm

## **Interested in Volunteering at Federation level?**

**Front Office Volunteers:** initially this is a good way to see the work of the Federation. Members volunteer to do a “shift” in the Front Office for a couple of hours a month. They are invaluable and are the first face anyone calling into the House sees, so you get to meet lots of members, and help the staff. Full training is given!

**Committees:** the activities of a particular Committee may interest you, for instance, and Louise can pass on your details to the Chairman, who will have a chat with you and may invite you to observe one of their meetings.

## **The Federation’s 500 Club**

This is run along the lines of the lottery, open to members only. There are 500 shares available, at £5 a share. Half the income supports the Federation, the other is given in prizes. There are three prizes, the numbers being drawn at the monthly Board Meeting. Every year the first draw takes place in November and ends the following October. You can apply for as many shares as you wish.

Both the Bursaries and 500 Club are advertised in Norfolk WI News and you can apply for either of them using the Application Form.



# The Federation Office Belongs to You!

The Federation Headquarters is at **Evelyn Suffield House** in Norwich (just a stone's throw from John Lewis). It was bought by members in 1952, who raised the money to buy the House and was named after the first President and Chairman, Lady Evelyn Suffield. So it belongs to all Norfolk WI members!

It is the hub of WI life in Norfolk and all Federation Committees meet here.

The House's opening hours are:

- Monday to Thursday, 10.30am-3.30pm
- Fridays when there is an event in the House

## So what will you find when you visit...?

To start with, you'll always find a warm welcome!

***A Fully-Equipped Kitchen*** – where you can make yourself a cup of tea or coffee for a small donation

***A Dining Room*** – which is also used for craft days and where the Bridge and Mah Jong Clubs meet

***The Committee Room*** – this is where the Committees meet and some workshops are held

***The Front Office*** – which sells all the WI stationery and gift items, and is staffed by volunteers. You can leave your parcels in the Front Office while you do more shopping!

***The Members' Room*** – where you can sit and relax with a drink, eat your lunch, wait for your bus, or meet a friend. There are noticeboards with Federation and other information to browse. There is also a loo!

***The Garden*** – is maintained by the volunteer Gardening Gang and a WISP (WI supportive partner). It is a haven in the centre of the city, where you can sit and relax – weather permitting!

***Car Park*** – we are very lucky to have a car park at the rear of The House, accessed from Surrey Street. Parking is guaranteed for anyone attending an event at Evelyn Suffield House and at other times may be available. Ring the Office the day before to check availability; the website calendar also has information about availability.

***Upstairs is the busy office***, from where all the administration is undertaken. If you have a query, don't hesitate to get in touch!
