#### Women's Institutes.

A meeting was held in the Shirehall. Norwich, on February 9th, with Lady Suffield in the chair, to introduce the Women's Institute Movement. This was very ably explained by Mrs. Nugent Harris, of the Institute Section of the Women's Branch of the Board of Agriculture.

The aim and object are :- To improve the conditions of rural life by stimulating interest in the agricultural industry, developing co-operative enterprise, encouraging home and local industries, studying home economics, providing a centre for educational and social intercourse, and for all local activities. The Institute is to be non-

sectarian and non-political.

Mrs. Nugent Harris said that Women's Institutes were a great success in Canada, where they were first started when the need was felt so greatly for encouraging and helping the inhabi-tants of isolated districts. Many of the lonely villages in the Mother Country also feel this need. In Wales and many of the counties of England, Institutes are successfully started, and the villages have become brighter and happier in consequence. At present there is a pressing, urgent need for utilising all the talent and resources in immediate war work, to save money, increase the food supply, and follow up with energy and loyalty all lines of work leading to the conservation of resources.

The Federation of Women's Institutes will furnish speakers and give advice. Institutes must be self-governing and self-supporting.

#### NOTES OF WOMEN'S INSTITUTE WORK.

A VERY successful meeting was held in Norfolk during January to consider the formation of a County Federation of Women's Institutes. The arrangements were made by Mrs. Burton-Fanning and Miss Burgess. Lady Fellowes took the chair. Lady Denman gave an account of the work done by the National Federation and of the advantages which would be gained if a County Federation advantages which would be gained it a County Federation were formed. The delegates present unanimously decided to form a Norfolk Federation. The ballot resulted in the following being elected to the committee:—Lady Albinia Donaldson, Mrs. E. Birbeck, Mrs. Edwards, Mrs. Burton-Fanning, Miss Burgess, Miss Duff, Miss Upcher, Miss Wise, with Lady Fellowes and Lady Suffield as representatives from the Women's Executive of the War Agricultural Committee. #### NORFOLK FEDERATION FORMED.

#### ADDRESS BY LADY DENMAN.

Delegates of the various Women's Institutes in Norfolk met at the Shirehall, Norwich, on Saturday for the purpose of considering the fca-Saturday for the purpose of considering the reasibility of forming a County Federation. Lady Fellowes, President of the Norfolk Women's War Agricultural Committee, presided, and an address was delivered by Lady Denman, of the National Federation of Women's Institutes.

Lady Denman spoke in congratulatory terms of the splendid start Norfolk women had made in establishing institutes. There were now 29 institutes in the county, a good record for the first year. This was a big national movement, and she hoped the institutes throughout the country would realise that they constituted one great sisterhood. The National Federation was the central organisation that had the care of the 800 institutes that now existed. It was established to help the institutes throughout the country, and also the county federations. Lady Denman went on to describe in detail the work of the National Federation. It had established an information bureau; it had sought to obtain Y.M.C.A. huts for the use of institutes, and it had done a great deal of trumpet-blowing, because, although the movement was known throughout the country, there were still people in London who were not fully aware of its importance.

During the war a number of institutes had started industries, and had obtained a ready safe for the goods produced. Now the war was over conditions would be changed, and it would be necessary to consider what kind of goods would meet with the readiest sale. The National Federation recommended the making of soft toys and fur gloves from rabbit skins, and was making arrangements for the provision of instruction in these occupations. The federation had obtained a grant of money from the Board of Agriculture, and as it realised that it was quite impossible for it to look after all the institutes in the country, it intended from this money to help the country federations. The county federations had most of the work to do so far as the institutes in the county were concerned. They could get out lists of speakers, discover new activities for the members, and in various other ways provide help. Many counties were taking up country dancing, which she hoped would also do something towards reviving love of music. A county federation, if it met fairly frequently, gradually came to have a very great influence on life in the county, and in some places the education authority had recognised this fact, and had supplied the institutes with lecturers and with funds. The whole strength of the movement lay in the institutes themselves. The most perfect organisation would be quite useless unless the institutes themselves. When she said democratic she meant that not only should the institute represent all sections in the village, but that the members should have the running of it in their own hands. There was a trend danger that the centrelic poople in the village should get the control of the institute into their own hands. There was not doubt that through these institutes country women could make themselves heard, and it was up to the National Federation. Rules were adopted, and the following were elected an Executive Committee:

# Lady Evelyn Suffield The Federation's First and Last President 1919 – 1948

'There is nothing I care more for than the Women's Institute. The more Institutes I visit the more I realise what a happy family we are' (Lady Evelyn Suffield, Norfolk supplement Home & Country)

Evelyn Louisa Wilson-Patten was born in London in 1870 and in 1896 married Charles Harbord, 6<sup>th</sup> Baron Suffield. Lady Suffield entered public life during WWI as a member of the Women's War Agricultural Committee helping to recruit women for

the first Women's Land Army. Through this committee the Women's Institute movement in Norfolk was born. Evelyn Suffield, with her outstanding personality, soon became one of the pioneers who guided the movement from small beginnings to the respected organisation that it continues be in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. A born leader, Evelyn took an interest in much of the social, and public life of North Norfolk. She was the first woman to serve as a Norfolk County Counsellor, was County Commissioner for Norfolk Girl Guides and sat on innumerable committees.

Lady Suffield was an inspirational, and much-loved County President for nearly thirty years. As a VCO (WI Adviser) she travelled round the county lecturing on the WI, and Public Health in the Villages. Encouraging members to work with her and with each other, and keen to bridge the class divide, as she described at the time, 'between the labourer's wife and the great lady'. Asking members to encourage younger women to join the WI she hoped they would a be a little more tolerant if they missed a meeting or two and not be so prim and proper! Otherwise, she warned them, 'it'll only be us old ones left'!

Lady Suffield retired as the first and last President in March 1948, a resolution was passed that no further president be elected. She died at home, Harbord House, Cromer in 1951, in her 81<sup>st</sup> year. 'The amazing development of the movement under her guidance has confounded the prophets who, at its birth, gave it from three to five years life, (by 1948 there were 225 institutes in Norfolk with 12,000 members). "Her wonderful powers of leadership will remain an inspiration for all time to those who loved her, and whose lives were enriched by her friendship.". (Mary L. Burgess, General Secretary, Norfolk Federation)

#### A Suite of Rooms for the Norfolk Federation

In 1920 a suite of rooms was secured to use as offices for the newly formed Norfolk Federation of Women's Institutes at 3 Davey Place, Norwich – NatWest Bank now stands on the site.

Furnishing the rooms was carried out on the most economical lines possible. Second-hand furniture was bought and re-covered, and floors stained. Members were thanked for the many items they had donated. Two of the top rooms were made available for men. A small library was created and, for a nominal charge, members could enjoy tea in the upper rooms and could be accompanied by gentleman friends!

Early in 1939 the Executive Committee was faced with the urgent problem of finding new premises. A lease was secured on 3 Castle Street, Norwich (Paperchase now occupies the building). The offices were more spacious and separate rooms for meetings were a welcome advantage. Members appreciated the delightful rest room.

Mrs Colman and Lady Morse financed necessary alterations and interior decoration, and Lady Suffield paid for the move. The Executive thanked Institutes and members for contributions to the facilities. During WWII the committee room was rented by the Women's Land Army for the duration of the War.

In 1950 a Resolution was passed that the Executive purchase a building or building site for a permanent WI Headquarters. This decision laid a great responsibility on all the members to raise funds. Institutes, on their own initiative, contributed £276 11s 4d (£276.57) and Hethersett WI were congratulated for organising a Christmas sale that raised £138 9s 7d (approximately £138.50). Due entirely to the efforts of members of the Federation, the sum of £4,000 was eventually raised to purchase a Georgian House in the centre of Norwich.

The move to 45 All Saints Green, Norwich, took place on 31st July 1952.

The official opening ceremony was performed by the Hon. Doris Harbord on 5<sup>th</sup> September, naming the house 'Evelyn Suffield House' in memory of her mother, the Dowager Lady Suffield.

The four other pioneers of the movement in Norfolk had rooms named after them; Mrs. Colman (Vice Chairman) Mrs. Burton-Fanning (Vice Chairman), Mrs. Mahon (Hon. Treasurer) and Miss M.L. Burgess (General Secretary). 'At Homes' were held during September and a representative from every Institute was invited.



The Executive extended their gratitude to the many members who had helped with moving, furnishing and equipping the offices and rest rooms. Miss Gates, the Federation Secretary from 1946-1967, lived on the first floor!

Although the typewriters of the 1950s may be silent now and letters written with pen and ink are a thing of the past, this special house remains a place for members to relax and enjoy one another's company, with opportunities to learn new skills. In our centenary year, Evelyn Suffield House continues to be the busy, working heart of the Federation, and a wonderful legacy initiated by those women of the WI, 67 years ago.



## **Speakers Biographies**

#### Peter Wilson MBE DL

For 25 years, Peter combined his commercial work as a theatrical producer with his responsibilities as Chief Executive of the Theatre Royal, Norwich. Peter's first West End production was Arnold Wesker's *Annie Wobbler* in 1985, starring Nichola McAuliffe. Since then his West End, Broadway and UK and international touring productions have included *Jerome Kern Goes to Hollywood, Broken Glass, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead, The Woman in Black* and *An Inspector Calls*. As producer and/or director he has worked with – among others – the National Theatre, the RSC, Matthew



Bourne, Ed Hall, I Fagiolini, Peter Hall, Stephen Daldry, Hampstead Theatre, the Tricycle, and he produced, managed and directed Mobil Touring Theatre, from 1985 to 2001. He is currently Chair of Ed Hall's Propeller and on the board of Leicester's Curve Theatre.



## Pam Ayres MBE

Pam has been a writer, broadcaster, and entertainer for over 40 years, and is one of the few authors who has had books in the Sunday Times bestseller charts in almost every decade since the 1970s. She is the author of several best-selling poetry collections and many of her poems are in school textbooks around the world including the UK, USA, China, Australia, New Zealand, Holland, South Africa, Ireland and Singapore. In 2016, once again, the most borrowed poetry book in UK Libraries was Pam's book, *You Made Me Late Again*.

Pam's last book, *The Last Hedgehog,* beautifully illustrated by Alice Tait, was published in May 2018, and within two weeks went to No. 1 in the Sunday Times Bestseller list. Pam's autobiography, *The Necessary Aptitude*, was the UK's bestselling female autobiography of 2011, and when her latest book of poetry, *You Made Me Late Again!* was first published in 2013, it went straight into the Sunday Times bestseller lists. Pam's next poetry book, *Up In The Attic*, will be published by Ebury Books in September this year.

Recent TV appearances have included: *Springwatch, Celebrity Antiques Road Trip*, an episode of *Women at War: 100 Years of Service*, about Pam's years in the WRAF in the 1960s and *Celebrity Mastermind* at Christmas 2017. For BBC Radio, Pam has recorded six series of *Ayres On the Air* for BBC Radio 4, and she is a regular guest on *Just A Minute*. Also for Radio 4, Pam is one of the few guests who have appeared twice on *Desert Island Discs*, the first time in 1979, and again last year.

Pam has appeared three times for HM The Queen, including at Sandringham WI in 2004. Subsequently, Pam was honoured to be awarded the MBE in Queen's Birthday Honours of 2004.

## **The Federation Logos**

#### The Old Harnser Logo Designed by Eileen Gomme

Eileen's background was calligraphy and she was also a demonstrator of corn dollies. Norfolk Federation was one of the first to have an Arts Committee and Eileen was one of the first to be on that Committee.



The year was 1977 (the year of the Queen's Silver Jubilee) and Eileen's WI friend's husband worked for the Post Office and was making a new Cover stamp. She thought there ought to be one for the WI and he thought we could have a commemorative First Day Cover

The Committee was working on items for the Silver Jubilee and were keen on the idea of a First Day Cover. The Executive asked Eileen to sit in on a planning meeting and by the end of that meeting she had designed the Harnser! Because of the brief from the Post Office, the design could not have what Eileen describes as "any feathery bits". Unfortunately, there are few First Day Covers left in our archives, as many were spoilt in the cellar flood.

It was later on that the design was made into a badge. In 1990-91, Ruth Johnson, the then Federation Secretary and Eileen, who was on the Executive, found one of the Covers and decided to design the badge which so many members own and which has served the Federation so faithfully.

#### The New Logo Designed by Victoria Palmer

Victoria grew up in Norfolk and spent her early years drawing and colouring almost continuously. She was inspired by book illustrations and having taken 'A' Levels in history, art and fashion & textiles undertook a two-year foundation course at The Norfolk Institute of Art and Design.



Following her HND, Victoria worked for Cambridge Theatre Company as a wardrobe assistant and then Derby Playhouse, being part of a small team responsible for making all the costumes. Victoria is now self-employed making bespoke bridal and evening wear.

Victoria's mother, Sheelagh, a Norfolk WI member, approached Victoria to help rejuvenate the Heron logo for the coming Century. Her initial design was developed by Catton Print in Norwich and the new badge motif was conceived by Margaret Collingwood, the Federation's Chairman.

#### Being extracts from the Minutes of the Executive Committee from 1919 to 1949

Aylmerton wrote stating that they did not want an Institute, and that they wanted a 'Hymn and something good'

1919

A lady from Cromer requested an institute be started there, the executive agreed that Cromer would not be a suitable place for a WI

1922-1925

Lady Suffield said that it had been brought to her notice how many people in Norfolk were unable to provide themselves with false teeth

Mrs Burton Fanning had taken exception to men being co-opted onto WI committees, but pointed out the great necessity for their help in running committees

1922-1925

The secretary reported that The Burnham Market Babies Percussion Band would be pleased to perform at the exhibition...

A letter was read from the Church of England Temperance society seeing if it would be possible for lectures to be given on the drink problem

1925-1930

Resolution from Mundesley...that this meeting views with alarm the threat to return to long skirts, and urges Institutes to do all in their power to prevent this being generally adopted

The secretary reported that a president had asked her to write concerning the behaviour of members at outings, who stopped at public houses on the return journey

1931-1939

The secretary reported considerable correspondence with National on the question of the failure of Mrs Adams to pass her rugmaking test

A letter was read from the secretary of the Telephone Development
Association offering lectures to
Women's Institutes on the subject of the pros and cons of "Shopping by

Agreed that Mrs Cannon, Terrington St Clements, be added to the speaker's list as a lecturer on 'Drama & Dogs' 5/- plus travel The question of the Rug 'A' test was further discussed: it was agreed the decision of the National judges must be upheld and that no further action be taken in the matter of Mrs Adam's rugs

Following a suggestion from a Miss Hoare that WI members seek permission to gather sticks which would otherwise be wasted, it was agreed that an anonymous letter be sent to the EDP

Congratulations were extended to Mrs Adams on her gaining a first class pass in the Rug-Making 'A' test of the Guild of Learners

#### 1940-1949

It was reported that the Rubber Central Control had intimated that mangles can have rollers recovered when they are worn to such a degree that they are no longer usable

The Secretary reported she had applied for the form of circulars which could be sent to WIs on the subject of venereal disease

The Secretary reported that at the National Council of Women meeting, the question of wives being legally entitled to a share of their husband's income was being brought forwards for action. Unanimously agreed that this should not be supported, as there had been no opportunity to consult members; the Executive was against it.

An American Officer had asked if it would be possible to put him in touch with girls who would be willing to attend a dance the following evening, The Secretary regretted she could not assist him in this way

Mundesley proposed a Resolution on mixed nudist camps. Agreed not to be adopted.

Miss Gates reported she had been reappointed on the Water and Sewage committee

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
