hen I first joined the WI in the seventies it was about supporting members. It provided a monthly meeting, enabling local women to meet and socialise, with a speaker to widen members' interests or knowledge on a wide variety of topics, plus opportunities to try or demonstrate crafts or their latest hobbies.

The group also contributed to local community events by providing refreshments for fetes, fairs, Christmas Bazaars etc. Often, they also ran stalls to sell member's handiwork to help raise money for their own, or local, charities.

The County and National Federations provided training and an opportunity to be elected to be part of the larger organisation.

Although all these things still happen, over the last decade or so, the WI seems to be providing much more for their communities. This includes keeping people up to date with new technology and helping to keep our increasingly ageing population safe and mentally and physically healthy, as well as helping to alleviate loneliness.

Within the last year they have worked closely with Norfolk County Council providing training for their members so that they can then tutor local people on how to use iPads, provided via the Library Service, to obtain information, contact services, order groceries, or just generally improve their lives.

They have also been instrumental in helping to disseminate information about the latest SCAMS to try to keep local people safe from frauds of all kinds, and, have fed back information to Trading Standards on SCAMS that local people have reported to them. This collaboration is highly valued.

Annual Meetings provide an opportunity for members to raise matters of concern for discussion and to get their opinions heard at all levels of society, including MPs.

WI members across Norfolk make a huge contribution to the lives of local residents, improving their wellbeing and helping local communities to thrive.

I know Norfolk County Council is very pleased and proud to work with them.
